<p><b>Ingredients</b></p>	<p>A food or drink item that forms part of a mixture or a meal. For example, flour is part of the mixture to make cakes.</p>		<p><b>Taste testing</b></p>	<p>A taste test is when you try different foods or drinks and compare them to see which one you enjoy more.</p>	
<p><b>Balanced plate</b></p>	<p>This means that you have a meal which has the right amount of each food group within it. The food groups are: fruit and vegetables, carbohydrates, protein (dairy, meat, fish, beans or pulses) and fats/sugars.</p>		<p><b>Hygiene</b></p>	<p>The things we do to keep clean and prevent the spread of germs that can lead to illnesses. For example: handwashing.</p>	
<p><b>Chef</b></p>	<p>A trained professional cook that may work in a restaurant or hotel.</p>		<p><b>Roy Lichtenstein</b></p>	<p>Roy Fox Lichtenstein was an American pop artist. In the 1960s he and other artists created a new type of art called 'Pop art' that was inspired by comic book strips.</p>

<p><b>Packaging</b></p>	<p>This is the container/materials that our food and/or drinks come in. e.g. labelled coffee jars.</p>		<p><b>Primary &amp; Secondary Colours</b></p>	<p>Can you remember these from Autumn 1?</p> <p>Primary colours - Red, yellow and Blue. When two of these primary colours are mixed they create secondary colours - purple, orange and green.</p>
