

Children need to develop the skills to read with speed, stamina and understanding. It is important that children continue to read daily from a range of texts (fiction, non-fiction and poetry). In year 6, children will have a reading journal. The purpose of this is to encourage reading for meaning. In the journal, children will create a piece of writing after they have finished a book. This could be: a letter from a character; turning a chapter into a playscript; writing a review for a magazine or writing a detailed description of a setting. Any other ideas are welcome.

1,800,000 words



Throughout the year, year 6 children will practise writing from a range of genres (see above). These will often be based on a class novel. In the first half of the autumn term, year 6 will be reading 'Kensuke's Kingdom' by Michael Morpurgo. It would be beneficial for all children to have their own copy of this novel to use during lessons. Writing is teacher assessed throughout the year.


Now, more infuriated than he had ever been, he repositioned his body, determined to end this embarrassment of a murder.
